Clarkson Announces Fall Sports Schedule

Clarkson University's chairman of athletics, William O'Flaherty, has announced a schedule of 73 events this fall for the Golden Knights' seven collegiate athletic teams.

Clarkson will field teams in cross country, golf, soccer, women's soccer, women's tennis, and women's volleyball. The Knights will also field a junior varsity soccer team.

Close to 110 athletes will represent themselves and the university on a schedule which runs from September to early November.

Matt Hogan, in his first year as coach of the cross country team, will guide the Golden Knight harriers in their opening competition at MIT on Sept. 12. Clarkson will participate in five cross country races.

After 22 years at the helm of the cross-country team Jack Phillips takes over reins of a new fall sport as he begins his first year as coach of the golf team. The Knights tee-off at the Utica College Invitational on Sept. 12-13 for the first of five tournaments.

Fourteenth year head coach Brian Chafin's soccer squad will meet the Golden Knight Alumni at 2 p.m. on Sept. 5 and will open a demanding 16 game regular season

schedule on Sept. 7 at Snell Field, against St. Michael's at 4 p.m.

Mike Kesselring, in his first year as coach, will guide the junior varsity soccer team in their opening match of an eight game season, at home against North Country Community College, at noon on Sept. 13.

The third year women's soccer coach Al Gotsch will guide the Lady Knights in an exhibition match against their alumnae, at noon on Sept. 5, before they open their 12 game season with a home contest against Canton College at 4 p.m., Sept. 10, on Jack Hantz Field.

The women's tennis team, under second year coach Brenda Skelley, begins an 11-match season at home against Potsdam College. The Sept. 9 contest is slated for a 3:30 p.m. start.

Dubby's Upsets Ogdensburg To Win NCSA Soccer Title

You can only buck the odds in sports so long before they catch up with you. The Ogdensburg Pepsi soccer team will attest to that as they fell to Dubby's of South Colton 2-0 in the championship game of the North Country Soccer Association playoffs.

In sports the odds say that championships are seldom repeated and that key victories come tough on the road. The Pepsi booters were chasing their fourth straight playoff crown and were completing their second season without a home field. The odds also had plenty of help from the Dubby's unit which complemented some outstanding goaltending by James Cole with an opportunistic attack.

Together the combination made for a long and frustrating evening for the local booters who were chasing the playoff crown after being displaced as the regular season titlists by TJ Toyota of Potsdam. Dubby's upended TJ Toyota from the playoffs to reach Sunday's title game where they prevailed from the fourth seed position.

The Pepsi booters dominated large portions of the game blending the finessful moves and passwork. Ogdensburg's efforts were thwarted however as a staunch Dubby's defense left most attack sequences incomplete and Cole preserved the shutout with some acrobatic netminding.

potential, but the coaching staff knows paper is only good for words. The players will have to decide their own fate on the field.

The Knights, who will be led by a trio of three-year letter winners; Dan Gasbarre, Vern Myers and Bill Hewes, will be looking to improve upon last season's sub-par 5-8-3 record.

For this year's team to be successful, Clarkson must continue its fine defensive play of last year, to help keep the pressure off an untested goalie, and to improve on last season's major weakness — scoring goals. In 1986 the Green and Gold suffered through five overtime contests with three ending in 0-0 ties.

New Goalkeeper
For the first time in four years the Knights will have a new goalkeeper. In the absence of graduated all-star Tim MacCarrick, stand a long line of qualified replacements. At the top of the list is junior Jim Stathopoulos, who has waited his turn tutoring under All-Americans MacCarrick and Vele Galovski. The coaching staff feels Stathopoulos is the player who has the most potential to become an All-American. He has played three seasons while allowing one goal, is ready to have a great two years in the posts.

If for some reason a replacement is needed, two returning players, senior Max Katz and sophomore Lee Carman, are ready to move in. Two incoming keepers, freshmen Paul Fowler and Brian Hamilla, will get the opportunity to work under MacCarrick, and vye for the junior varsity positions. Good competition will bring out the best in these players.

Strong Defense

The back four of the Golden Knights should remain intact. This is a unit that allowed just a goal a game in 1986 and contributed to shutting out six opponents. The key, as in most cases, is the sweeper back. Sophomore Peter Eisenzopf filled in nicely for the injured Myers at that position last year and gained valuable experience for the upcoming season.

In front of him is senior Tom Barth, who plays a dominating game as a tenacious stopper back. On the outside will be juniors Neal Solomon and Bart Couture, players who move up extremely well after securing their own position. Two players who could break into the line-up or fill in the rotation are sophomore Bob Criscula and freshman Bill Belke.

Strong Midfield Means Power
The Clarkson midfield area must be in control for the Knights to dominate games. Coach Chafin is looking for power as a source of success in the middle, with speed and skill on the wings.

Moving back to his comfortable home at center back is senior captain Jason Jones, who spent a partial year as sweeper. Flanking along side of him will be classmate Brian Colby, who is a two-year starter and ready to come into his own. Junior Kevin Sealy gives a balance to the middle with skill and soccer sense.

On the outside, the Knights have sophomore John Durocher joining senior tri-captain Hewes. Both have fine speed and good skills to deliver the ball to the danger areas.

Professional Hockey Teams Facing-Off In Lake Placid

LAKE PLACID — A pair of rising National Hockey League powers that rely on rock-solid defense and dramatic goals play in Lake Placid on Oct. 2 when the Washington Capitals and the Hartford Whalers tangle just five days before their regular NHL seasons begin.

The 7:30 p.m. exhibition game at the Olympic Center promises to be a hard-hitting night of professional hockey. Tickets went on sale Friday at the Olympic Center Box Office, Ticketron and all regular Olympic Center outlets.

The Capitals won 50 NHL games two seasons ago but were bumped out of the Stanley Cup playoffs this past spring by the New York Islanders. Washington is primed for a longer playoff run this year led by veteran goalie Pete Peeters, towering defenseman Rod Langway and high-scoring defenseman Larry Murphy (81 points last year). Sharp-shooting scorers for the Capitals are Mike Gartner, Kevin Hatcher and 1980 Olympic star Dave Christian.

Bryan Murray is the head coach of the Capitals who will also be training at the Olympic Center for four days prior to the Friday night exhibition game.

Hockey fans worldwide need little introduction to Hartford goalie Mike Liut. Regarded as one of the premier defenders in the world, Liut led the Whalers to the Adams Division title last year. Hartford allowed more than 400 goals in 1982-83 before Liut arrived, and last year the Whalers gave up just 270.

Besides sharing the same farm club in Binghamton, the two teams both skate hard and count on their defense to set the tempo of each contest.

Liut was clearly MVP of the Whalers, and he was third in the NHL most valuable player tabulation behind Wayne Gretzky and Ray Bourque. He has won more than 200 NHL contests and is the main reason the Whalers are considered a strong Stanley Cup contender this year.

In front of the sturdy Whaler netminder, veteran defenseman Doug Jarvis carries an NHL-record streak of 962 games played. Other star players for the Whalers are Kevin Dineen (40 goals last year), Ron Francis the team captain (30 goals, 63 assists) and John Anderson (75 total points).

Hartford is coached by Jack Evans and the club's president and general manager is hockey legend Emile Francis.

The NHL exhibition, just a few

nights before the regular season starts for the professionals, takes place in a very exciting hockey period in Lake Placid. The Olympic Series continues Oct. 10 when the USA Olympic Team challenges the Canadian Olympic Team at the Olympic Center, the third of the four-game set. The series reaches a dramatic finale on Dec. 22 when the Soviets face the USA Olympic Team.
